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Title:	Activity Report of Macao SAR with reference to November 2007
Meeting:	IRG#29 in San Jose, California, U.S.A.
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1. After the 28th meeting of ISO/IRG in Xian, Shanxi, China, the Committee for Unification of Computer Chinese Character Encoding in Macao SAR has completed the following tasks to ISO/IRG:
 - We confirmed that the information of 16 characters submitted by Macao SAR in CJK C v9.0 and v9.1 is correct on 2007-6-18 and 2007-8-2, respectively.
 - We submitted our comments of Macao characters in CJK D v2.0 on 2007-8-23.
 - We submitted Macao's TTF fonts, totally 94 characters, according to the mapping table of CJK D v2.0, on 2007-8-28.
 - We submitted our comments of Macao characters in CJK D v2.1 on 2007-10-9.
 - We submitted our comments of the first 500 characters (00001 – 00500) in CJK D v2.1 on 2007-10-15.
2. As mentioned in our comments of Macao characters in CJK D v2.1 submitted on 2007-10-9, besides some characters' attributes and glyphs to be revised, **we found that nine (9) Macao characters submitted cannot be found in CJK D v2.1.** We would be greatly appreciated if the IRG could help to follow up this.

Just to summarize: Macao SAR has so far submitted 119 characters to IRG. Out of them, 16 characters were adopted in CJK C, 103 characters should be under review in

CJK D.

3. Referring to the resolution IRG M28.5, Macao SAR would like to nominate Mr Clement Chau (cchau@safp.gov.mo) and Prof. Tam Mei Leng (mltam@umac.mo) to join the Annex S Review Ad Hoc Group.
4. Internally, the Committee for Unification of Computer Chinese Character Encoding in Macao SAR has been working in full effort this year to establish our standard. The consultation of “Macao Information Systems Character Set”¹ to public departments in Macao was completed in September. Most departments support the unification framework. After formal approval, we are planning to publish the regulations this year. Next year, we will focus on the administrative and technical solutions, in order to implement the unification framework successfully.
5. Due to intensive working schedule, we sincerely apologize not be able to join the IRG#29 meeting.
