

Proposal to encode two historical Persian letters used for *ezafe*

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Proposal

Encode the following two characters:

codepoint	glyph	name
U+10EC0		ARABIC LETTER DOTLESS HALF YEH
U+10EC1		ARABIC LETTER HALF YEH

Background

This is a proposal to encode two new characters in the Arabic Extended-C block in order to represent letters used in Early New Persian as well as modern scholarly publications.

These two proposed letters are the historical forms of the mark put after a word-final silent *heh* to represent *ezafe* (pronounced /je/ in modern Iranian Persian). Over the centuries, these merged into a single dotless version, became smaller and moved over the *heh*, and then merged with *hamza* above (U+0654) to produce ٺ. (One hypothesis is that the merger with *hamza* above may have happened due to limitations in typesetting environments, others blame the scribes.)

Evidence of the usage of the characters in both manuscripts and modern scholarly text is provided. There is contrastive usage between the dotted form and the dotless form in at least one manuscript, and that contrast is reproduced in modern scholarly works about the language and the writing system of the era. The significance of the contrast is not known to us and is probably lost in time. Since Unicode doesn't unify Arabic letters that differ in dots, and the contrast has been kept in modern scholarly works, two characters are proposed.

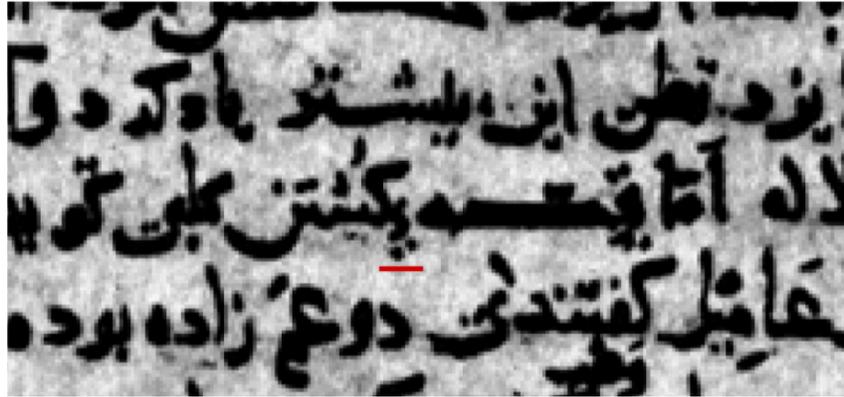
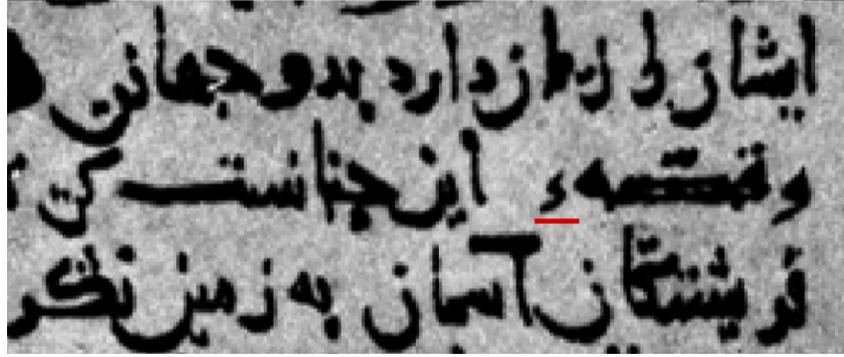
The dotless version is confusable with a stand-alone *hamza* (U+0621) as well as the isolated form of kashmiri *yeh* (U+0620).

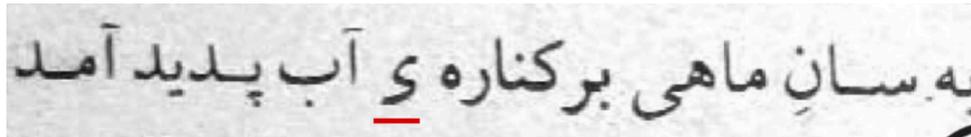

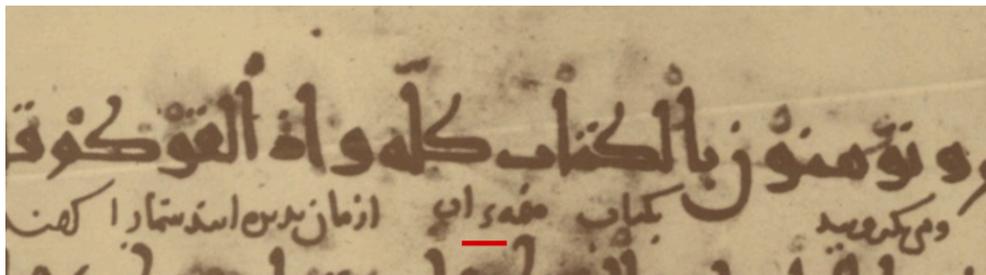

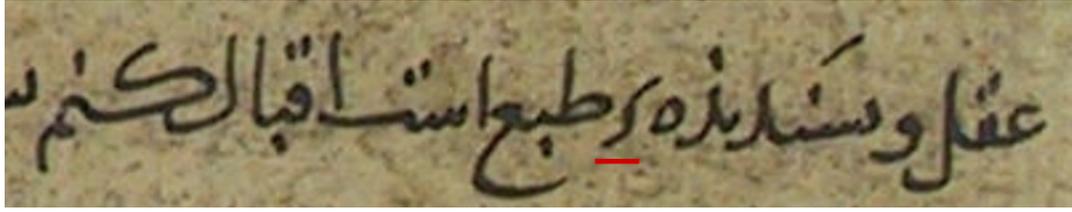

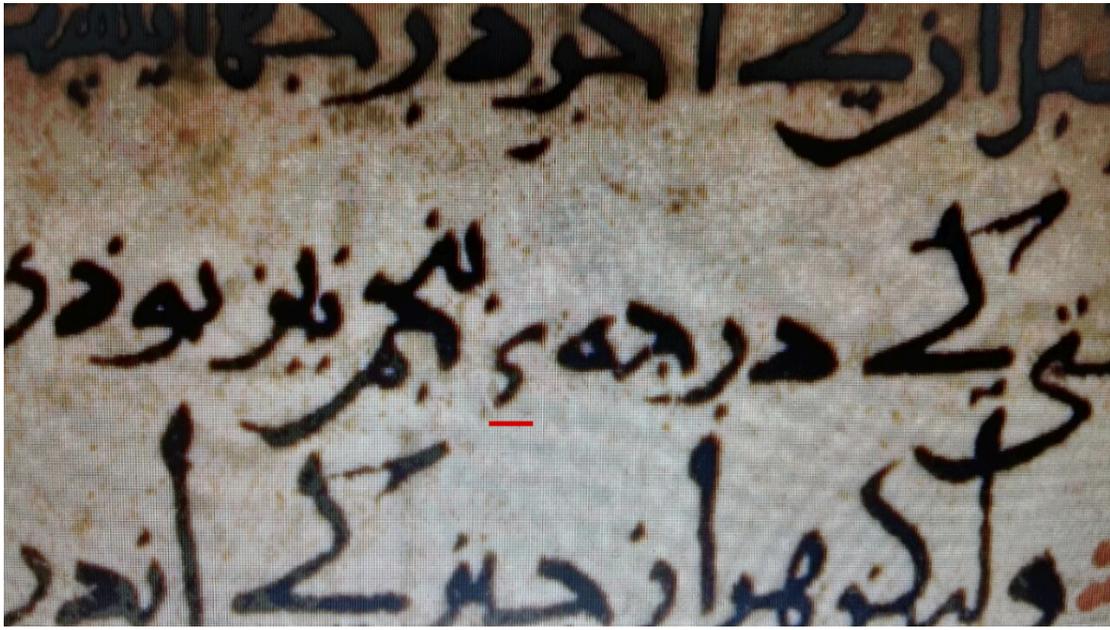

۴ - اتکاء به قواعد منطقی دستور زبان فارسی .

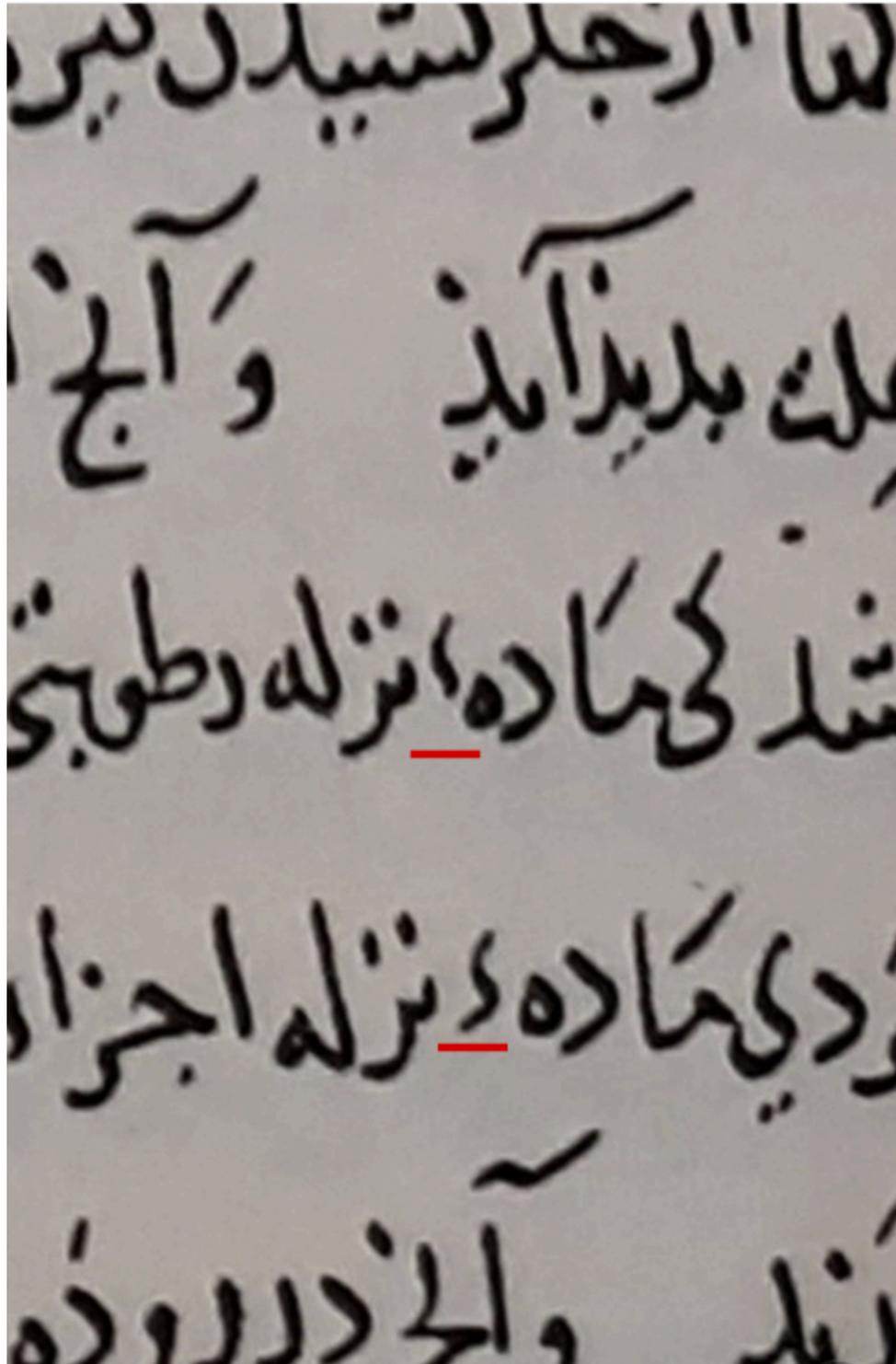
۵ - پیروی از شیوه خط عربی در موارد مشترك میان دو زبان فارسی و عربی. از این جمله اصل اول هرگز ما را به جایی نمی‌رساند. کسانی که با نسخه های خطی قدیم فارسی و خطوط خوشنویسان معروف آشنائی دارند می‌دانند که اولاً در هیچ موردی خط فارسی قاعده ثابت و واحد نداشته است؛ و ثانیاً در طی قرون متعددی که آثار ادبی زبان فارسی کتابت شده است تحول و تغییر بسیار در شکل حروف و شیوه نوشتن کلمات روی داده است. بنابراین از نسخه‌های قدیم نمی‌توان حکم واحدی استخراج کرد. برای مثال می‌توان شیوه کتابت کسره اضافه را در حالی که کلمه به هاء بیان حرکت (یا هاء غیر ملفوظ) ختم شده باشد ذکر کرد. در این مورد ابتدا بعد از کلمه شکل «ی» نوشته می‌شد. مانند: «خانهی من». بعد، برای آنکه نشان بدهند که این حرف یای اصلی نیست و تنها بر اثر التقاء دو کسره چنین تلفظ می‌شود، در کتابت شکل آن را اندکی تغییر دادند و سرحرف «ی» را نوشتند. به این صورت: «خانهی من». پس از آن شاید برای آنکه حروف و کلمات کمتر جا بگیرد این علامت را بالای حرف هاء قرار دادند و آن را به شکل همزه درآوردند و این صورت از آن حاصل شد: «خانه من». بنابراین، شکل نوشتن این حرف پیوسته در تحول بوده است و صورت نخستین شاید ناقص‌ترین وجه آن باشد. L

در موارد فصل و وصل حروف و کلمات هم کمتر نسخه‌ای را می‌توان پیدا کرد که در سراسر آن قاعده واحدی برای نوشتن يك وجه مراعات شده باشد، تا آنجا که گاهی در يك سطر کاتب کلمه واحد را به چند صورت نوشته است. يك مثال این مورد، حرف «به» اضافه است که گاهی به کلمه بعد وصل شده و گاهی جدا نوشته شده است.

با توجه به این نکته‌ها در می‌یابیم که اتکاء به شیوه نوشتن کاتبان قدیم ما را به جایی نمی‌رساند و مشکلی را حل نمی‌کند. پس باید در پی اصول دیگر رفت.
